Everyone is challenged, even experienced artists, because the elements of painting outdoors add a new dimension to the challenge of capturing a scene. Everyone deals with the same elements, and it makes plein air painting an adventure for all levels of experience.

Paint-Outs are a delicious opportunity to see beautiful scenery, interesting or historic buildings, boats, people, animals, clouds, sunsets, fountains, etc. The list is endless! Also a chance to take photos for future paintings and reference on the one you paint for later finishing touches.

Some favorite locations we have been in the past include the towns of San Antonio, Nacogdoches, Galveston, Jefferson, New Orleans, and Caddo Lake for overnights. We also have taken daytrips to Brazoria, Iola, Anderson, Navasota, Calvert, and Kemah, to name

by galleries around the country, and his work has been reproduced in print by the New York Graphic Society and Bruce McGaw Graphics.

He will lead members in a "follow me" process as the group attempts to capture a river scene in Pennsylania. He enjoys sharing his experiences as an artist and his watercolor techniques, which he admits are unorthodox and often times made up in the moment in response to an effect needed to capture the subject.

He readily admits that his objective is to capture the essence of the subject rather than to do a pretty watercolor painting. He sees the world as gritty and organic, and he tries to capture that quality using the medium of watercolor.

Outreach at the Watercolor Art Society of Houston

Part of the mission of the Watercolor Art Society of Houston is to further the interest of watermedia art through Outreach. We believe, as a society of artistic individuals, that we can offer art education and experience to the Greater Houston community. If you are involved in one of our Outreach programs, thank you for helping us carry on our mission.

Currently, we host gallery showings, receptions/events, demos, classes, workshops, paint-ins/outs, and a working library to develop interest in watermedia.

We share in partnership at Texas Children's Hospital (TCH) and the High School for the Performing and Visual Arts (HSPVA).

At Texas Children's Hospital volunteers are given the opportunity to paint with donated watercolor supplies alongside children receiving treatment. The painting session is casual. There is onsite parking, and the time commitment is roughly two hours. WAS-H has also recently partnered with TCH's West campus, and we are in need of volunteers in both locations.

WAS-H judges the junior and senior show at the HSPVA and picks winners who will receive scholarship money for continued art education art programs.

WAS-H also hosts free classes every Thursday morning to senior citizens of the Greater Houston community. We are looking for volunteer teachers for this opportunity, Please email Mary Rustay, the director of this program, for more information at rustgeo@aol.com.

WAS-H recently partnered with The Beacon, a nonprofit organization in downtown Houston that offers basic needs services to the homeless. WAS-H

DEFINITELY ON THE GO



Theresa Wilson's apparent love of traveling also includes weekend trips, which she finds "energizing."

Because of her family's "aggressive sightseeing schedule", she finds that her camera is an "essential tool." Taking many photos, she "pulls components from several photos to make a single painting."

Theresa remarks that "If there is something I really want to paint later, I take the big picture of the whole scene, and some close-ups pictures, where detail would be nice, and to capture things in great light."

She saves these for a series. Currently some of her series are of graveyards, unique architecture, restaurant interiors, and horses.

In her early traveling times, Theresa brought a small, palm-sized Winsor & Newton watercolor set and small supplies. Now, she has expanded her supplies to a half-dozen tubes of basic colors, small travel palette, half-sized sketchbook, a watercolor sketchbook, quarter-sized sheets of paper, more drawing supplies, and brushes.

These are placed in a Tupperware container, then a tote. She emphasized that she does not take charcoal, because of its messiness. And she doesn't make a finished painting on the road, but wants to capture the feeling of a place.

Theresa's geological engineer background, with its detailed map drawing, may have catapulted her into her enjoyment of art classes and workshops, spanning years of classes at Glassell, New Orleans Academy of Fine Arts, University of New Orleans, and an extensive list of famed artists.

In her first workshop, she fondly remembers Duane Light. She still uses his compositional concepts, and his adage: "A watercolor should knock the socks off an oil painting from across the room."

Perhaps Theresa's favorite workshop was with Sondra Freckelton and Jack Beal in Oneonta, NY. She was amazed that Sondra's 5 x 5 watercolors were painted with a #6 brush. From Catherine Chang Liu's workshop Theresa remembers the advice of "working in a series" and the adamant urge to paint in a studio at least two hours daily.

All of this art advice travels with Theresa. Her favorite U.S. destination is Mackinac Island, especially in June for Lilac Festival. Her overseas trips are endless. She and her family have scoured large and small towns in many countries, especially by car. On her recent trip to Yugoslavia, the State Department's driving advice made her decide to take a guided tour instead, where she also heard local stories.

Therese's extensive traveling, and her years in art, comes through in her watercolors. She remarks: "I don't think there is any more stimulating activity than travel. Everything about travel requires you to get "out of yourself," new sights, sounds, smells, people, schedules, etc."

From Breckenridge to New Orleans to her next unique overseas destination,

Theresa's expertise and travels are apparent in her work.

there before. As I have said before, we really appreciate the hospitality of our members and friends, and we try to be good guests. As always, we are lining up our fall and spring locations, so PLEASE CALL ME SOON SO WE CAN GET IT ON THE LIST. We need ideas both in town and down the road, ASAP!

You will have painters around you to enjoy getting to know and from which you can learn. Such a great experience! Anyone may attend, member or not, and may bring a friend or spouse (painter or non). Attendance varies each month, with anywhere from 2 or 3 to 20 plus participants. We never know for sure, as some people come late to the Paint-Out. We usually arrive on location by 9 am and paint until 3 pm, to have 4-6 hours of painting time including eating a brown bag lunch on site.

Paint-Outs are scheduled for the 3rd Saturday of each month during the school year, although sometimes we have to reschedule or cancel due to weather — heat or rain or cold — or a major holiday conflict, etc. You may look for email notices and also check announcements in the *Washrag* or on our website for latest information each month.

To sign up to attend, please call or text Mary Rustay, Paint-Out Chairman, at 713-703-1533 (cell), or email me at rustay@heritagetexas.com (W) or rustgeo@aol.com (H). I will put your name on the list and watch for you. We mostly meet at the designated location, but occasionally carpool and/or caravan to the Paint-Out site from the WAS-H building. Always feel free to call me or another artist who might be going, if you need a ride.

SOMETIMES THE WEATHER FORECAST IS MISLEADING! In Texas and especially in Houston, a shower can always pop up. Often rain is predicted and it bypasses us or our part of Houston. Sometimes it is raining here, but the weather is totally different as we drive out of town to our location in the countryside. Do not be discouraged by



weather the reports are often wrong or

change. Bring a large beach umbrella and you will be prepared. You can always wait it out in the car!



Don't expect a masterpiece at every Paint-Out, but do consider your painting a study for a future work. Paint-Out is a chance to record what one sees and to enjoy the camaraderie and the moment. You can even learn to paint under scrutiny, because the public loves to see an artist at work, and is fascinated at watching a painting evolve right before their very eyes. If by chance a stranger walks by where you are painting, looks over your shoulder, and admiringly asks if you ever sell your work, you can answer "yes, whenever I am satisfied that it is finished." Just choose a price and get their information.

What should you bring to a Paint-Out? Here are my "must haves" learned from years of experience:

- A folding stool or chair to sit upon;
- A second stool or chair or easel on which to rest one's board;

A rolling, folding metal grocery cart to tote my supplies, chair, stool, my water, camera, etc. I can also use my cart as an easel and lean my board on it while I paint;
A watercolor board with a few pieces

• A watercolor board with a lew pieces (continued on page 8)

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of paper attached with clips or clamps — I prefer either 140 lb. cold press or 300 lb., or 140 lb. hot press occasionally; • A camera or cell phone camera — a quick digital for quick studies or even an old Polaroid does a great job at capturing the lights and shadows so one does not get confused as the day lengthens; • My art supplies in a tote bag (paints,

palette, brushes, pencil, eraser, water container with water, Kleenex and/or paper towels, ruler/straight edge); • Clips or tape to hold paper down on

the board in the wind;

• Sunglasses, sunscreen, film (still use it?), lunch or snack and drinks, insect repellant;

• A large umbrella that one takes to the beach for shade, or a golf umbrella or clip-on umbrella that attaches to your

chair often takes glare off your paper

and protects you from sunburn; Take LOTS OF PHOTOGRAPHS FOR REFERENCE, especially as light changes. The photos may be as important as the painting as they allow you to complete the painting at home if neces-

sary, or start over with lots of fresh material for future paintings.

We encourage YOU to come and enjoy the experience. Our members are eager to know you and each other and WELCOME NEW FACES AT THE PAINT-OUTS. We promise you'll want to do it again! It is addictive! HOPE TO SEE YOU VERY SOON.







WAS-H has a wonderful outreach program called The Senior Class. It is hard to believe that it was started 30 years ago in 1986 at the Houston Junior Forum by Mary Rustay! Mary loved watercolor and decided to make her Junior Forum service commitment to teach watercolor to senior citizens. Mary taught the seniors at the Houston Junior Forum's Recreational Center for Older Adults for several years. Eventually, Mary moved her senior group over to the upstairs studio of the original WAS-H building when the RCOA closed. Mary continues to lead The Senior Class co-supported by WAS-H and the Houston Junior Forum, as she loves both watercolor and the Seniors who wish to learn more about it.

The Junior Forum initially funded the Senior Watercolor class with \$300 annually. Mary has applied for a recent HJF outreach grant for this class and the Grant amount has grown over the last few years from \$1000 to \$1500 per year. The grant helps defray costs for the color printer, printer ink and various art supplies for the class. This outreach effort is for senior citizens. No tuition is charged. The class provides free watercolor instruction as well as opportunities for Seniors to socialize and grow a sense of community. While many of the attendees of the Senior Class did not start out as WAS-H members, many subsequently have become members and leaders in WAS-H to further support and partake in its various activities.

The Senior Class has become very popular and often has a waiting list. Whereas it began as a class of about 10 or less, the class size has increased greatly, and there are usually a minimum of 30-35 attendees (and over 50 on the rolls) at each session. Eligibility and Requirements:

- Artist must be a current WAS-H member.
- Up to 3 entries per artist.
- Fee of \$10 per entry.
- Artwork Regulations:
- Only original artwork accepted. May not be a likeness of another's work, (i.e., painting, drawing, photograph-digi image or print).
- Completed in the last 24 months.
- Not painted under supervision or in a class.
- At least 80% watermedia.
- Surfaces: paper, Claybord, or Yupo only.
- Has not won a WAS-H award or been in International or Annual Member's Exhibits.
- Framing Regulations:
- Artwork must be framed (only exception is Clayboard wooden cradle panels).
- Frames must be plain, simple grooves only.
- White or off-white mats and liners.
- Frame width must not exceed 2".
- Must be strung with wire for hanging.
- Plexiglas, if glass is needed.
- Paintings not to exceed 48" in height or width, frame included.

Awards

- Cash Awards for 1st \$100 / 2nd \$75 / 3rd \$50.
- Honorable Mentions awarded a ribbon no cash.
- Only one award per artist.
- Winners are notified by phone.

Sales

- WAS-H accepts a 20% donation for sale of artwork.
- Artwork must remain in gallery for duration of the show. Price does not include sales tax, which will be added at tip
- of sale.
- A 5% fee is taken out of credit card sales.
- All sales include frames.

Liability

WAS-H will not be liable for damage before, during, or after the exhibit. Artwork must: adhere to these guidelines, be appropriate for a family venue, and be acceptable to the juror. Abbreviations
