"Strong design elements, good division of space, and pattern/shape relationships in a composition are elements that I initially look for in a painting. Once a composition meets these three criteria, I then evaluate the technical handling of the medium by the artist and ask, 'Is this the right medium to use for this composition?' Creativity is very important. I like an artist that takes risks and goes beyond what they see, providing individual interpretations of subject matter. Paintings that meet all of these



Uncrating the paintings for the International Exhibition Friday, March 6



How is it assembled? How can it come apart? What's the efficient way to fabricate the product, and how much manpower will it take? These are routine questions that form the normal thinking of an engineer's mind. Some are born with a brain that's genetically wired that way and find their gift to the world is putting that thinking to use and making a contribution using it. Jack Ayres has swapped logic, critical thinking, and structural principals for brushes, watercolor pigment, and a whimsical imagination, to make watercolor paintings. But in making the swap he didn't completely shelve the engineering thinking he lived by for so long. He simply repackaged those skills as the commander-in-chief of logistics for the International Exhibition. For a couple of years now he has developed and directed a team of volunteers to receive, categorize, uncrate, store, then re-crate and return ship the 70 or so paintings shipped each vear to the exhibit.

With poise, careful thought, and planning he and his team, with calculated precision and care unpack, register







and make ready for hanging every painting shipped to the International Exhibition. If anyone has witnessed him and his team in action, it appears chaotic, but underneath the appearance his team works with bee-like precision to identify the best way into each package, carefully extracting the "honey" leaving a carefully identified trail that allows each painting to be returned to its creator as soundly as it arrived.

He is a maestro in direction of a symphony of processing. Without his direction and initiative, the show would not happen. He has been steadily and quietly performing this task for sometime now and does so willingly without cajoling. He is a volunteer's volunteer and deserves our hearty thanks. It is with appreciation, pride, and joy that we honor him with "Volunteer of the Month," which is an underwhelming acknowledgement of a huge assignment so well done. Thank you is simply not a big enough word!

(continued from page 2) makes a value study to determine his pattern of light, dark, and medium val-

His technique emphasizes clean, fresh paint, which he loads on his brush two or three colors at a time, thus avoiding overmixing. He lets the water do its magic of blending flowing colors on the paper. This creates large shapes with soft edges that he later defines with smaller strokes that bring out the area of emphasis.

One of the dangers Eric pointed out to us is the fact that neither the camera nor the computer can clearly reproduce color in shadow, which draws the light out of the photo, and thus out of the painting. When judging a show, he particularly looks for beautiful mixes of color in painted shadows.

Thank you, Eric, for so many great pointers: connect shapes by overlapping them in the underpainting; use clean, fresh paint, a large brush and plenty of water; put color in the shadows; always choose good design over reality; and most of all, have fun painting!

- Paintings should be planned, created and framed by an intergenerational pair of artists (adult and child) as a collaborative, shared adventure.
- Adult artist must be current WAS-H member or Poe adult.
- Child artist must be between the ages of 5-12 and in elementary school.
- Up to 3 entries per artist-adult/child pair.
- Fee of \$5 per entry.
- Artwork Regulations:
- Original composition
- Must include a creature(s) (e.g. animal, bird, fish, reptile, bug, etc.) real or imaginary.
- Completed in the last 24 months.
- Watermedia (watercolor, tempera, acrylic, gouache, casein).
- Surfaces: Watercolor paper (140 lb. or heavier), yupo or clayboard.
- Size: 15" X 22" or smaller.
- Painting has not won a WAS-H award.
- Framing Regulations:
- Plain, simple frame no more than 2" wide.
- Mats & liners, if used, must be white or off-white.
- Plexiglass only. NO GLASS!
- Paintings must be framed and STRUNG WITH WIRE for hanging.

Awards

- Cash awards for first \$100, second \$75, third \$50.
- Honorable Mentions awarded a ribbon no cash.
- Only one award per artist-pair.
- Winners are notified by phone.

Sales

- Paintings can be marked not for sale –"NFS."
- WAS-H accepts a 20% donation for sale of artwork.
- Artwork, including sold paintings, must remain on exhibit until Friday June 5.
- Price does not include sales tax, which will be added at time of sale.
- A 5% fee is taken out of credit card sales.
- All sales include frames
- 1st Place winner must remain on display at WAS-H until Friday, July 3.
