The 2015 International Exhibition entries are in the process of being juried; accepted artists will be receiving acceptance notification soon!

If you receive a notice that your work has been accepted to the International Exhibition. Please be sure to go back onto the CaFÉ website and complete your entry by prepaying your handling fees. Be sure to read and understand the instructions and timeline for delivery of work under the Legal Agreement.

The delivery deadline for accepted work is by the gallery close of business on March 5 at 3 pm.

If you hand deliver your work to WAS-H, the handling fee is \$25. If you ship your work to the gallery via UPS or FedEx, the fee is \$35. All work delivered to the gallery, by hand or by shipment, must be completely framed and wired, ready to hang, or it will not be accepted into the gallery. No work will be accepted "in a tube." Jay's Frames in the Heights has agreed to frame and deliver works for the Exhibition – please see the information on the CaFÉ site if you would like to give his service a try. All shipped work to be returned to the artist MUST INCLUDE a suitable box,

packing, and sufficient return shipping label, or the artist must make arrangements to pick up the work within one week of the close of the Exhibition, April 10, 2015.

Eric Wiegardt – Our Exhibition Judge and March Major Workshop

We are honored to announce that our judge for the 2015 International Exhibition is nationally acclaimed artist Eric Wiegardt. Here is a message from Eric about the upcoming Exhibition. His words may help you decide what and how you want to paint for this year's entries, or at least help you get started.

"Thank you for the honor of judging this show. It can be a rather humbling experience as there are so many strong paintings in a show of this caliber. As always, I select those paintings that exhibit an understanding of design, i.e. excellent shape construction and value distribution. Regardless of subject matter, these paintings catch the eye and read excellence from across a room.

Secondly, I look for a facility of the medium and a respect for the time-honored discipline of painting. For example, the colors should be clean and not muddy, both in the light and shadows. Are the strokes con

She credits the development of her painting talent with taking many classes and workshops from many teachers and visiting artist in the early years at WAS-H. Mary has been a vital part of WAS-H since its very beginning and has been a regular volunteer through the vears. One of Mary's contributions is being director of the seniors, Äô art class which she teaches with Joanie Hughs. She has a weekly subject and gives a demonstration of different techniques. The subject matter is varied, from florals

January Demo — Janet Hassinger

Janet Hassinger, MFA not only judged the January WAS-H show, she stepped up to the plate when a substitute was needed for the demo at the January general meeting. We were not disappointed as she demonstrated what she is known for in her paintings ,Äì her masterful transparent veils of color and patterns. Besides being one of our long time WAS-H teachers, Janet has an impressive background that includes being a professor for the past18 years at the Glassell School, as well as being a teacher, curator and Director for 15 years at College of the Mainland. She maintains her studio in Galveston, has had several one person shows and her work is in collections all over the United States.

In her talk, Janet emphasized many of the techniques she uses in her abstract and non-representational paintings, such as using stencils to get interesting edges or to lift paint. She showed us how she uses tracing paper to draw abstract shapes from nature, which she then moves around the page to begin a painting or to help her visualize possible shapes to a painting that needs more balance or definition. Line and brush stokes can add emotion and interest. She creates some interesting lines with saran wrap and she uses large rock salt to create interesting patterns. She reminded us of the importance of thinking ahead of time in order to leave white on the page; applying kitchen contact paper cut into interesting shapes can be used to do this. Janet discussed open and closed shapes and demonstrated how to do graded washes in both. Another tip Janet teaches to check the balance and placement of a center of interest when a painting needs something, is to slip the painting into a large plastic envelop which is pre-marked with a tic-tac-toe grid. This quickly shows her where she can use the rule of thirds to help her make further choices.

We are grateful for Janet for all the reminders of techniques we can use to improve our paintings. She has a class at WAS-H which begins February 9.

Saturday Paint-In

Incorporating Botanicals Susan Giannantonio Sat., Feb. 14, 2015, 9:30 am - 3:30 pm



There are several unique ways to introduce plant and botanical elements into your paintings and during this paint-in we will explore a few of them. This will require some unusual supplies.

Supplies

Along with your traditional watercolors, paper and brushes, you will need:

- Pressed leaves with prominent veins (press overnight in phone book or old book). Some leaves that work beautifully are ferns, coleus, lobbed leaves, herbs, and many others. Look for interesting shapes. It is important that you press them overnight.
- Shallow dish (take-out container, etc.) to lay leaves into detergent water
- Small container of shampoo or dish detergent
- Gatorboard, cardboard, tray or old plexiglass to transport your work (some work you create will not be dry when you take it home). You might make several paintings.
- Flat glass beads (not marbles) or small flat stones for weights. These can be purchased in most dollar stores, nurseries, etc.
- A couple cotton or terrycloth rags (optional), paper towels

fidently placed? Is the artist using the unique characteristics inherent to the medium, as in edge quality? There should be a consistency of interpretation. Are the foundations of drawing upheld, either in the form of realism or thoughtful distortion?

Lastly, I look for those that have the courage and ability to express themselves well. I try to honor those who are willing to put themselves out on a limb, to risk acceptance for the sake of personal expression, and appear to enjoy the heat of battle this unique medium offers. Style has nothing to do with this, the paintings can be loose, or very tightly rendered. Expressive and disciplined draftsmanship, without the aid of photographic projection, causes me to take



2015, HERE WE COME Has the new year started without you and your list of "goals"?

Never fear, art friends, the world will still offer an array of art classes, art books, and workshops. If you are too late to sign up for scheduled classes, consider one-day workshops. Art stores and other art-related organizations offer workshops and demos also.

As a jumping-off point for Inspiration, peruse Art History books. Did you know that:

- Norman Rockwell painted 4,000 paintings. He was one focused man.
- Even before Monet immortalized Giverny in France, American artists developed an active artists' place there.
- Winslow Homer painted in watercolor and oil.
- In 1832, as he traveled to Algeria and Morocco, Eugene Delacroix filled seven notebooks with watercolors and drawings.

Other than these being cocktail party conversational quips, it shows that artists have always had a need to keep drawing, keep painting, keep being involved, keep learning.

Asked about an Ideal Art Escape, Marsha Harris responded: "...find warm, sunshine beaches with

My Ideal Art Escape would be an Away-workshop. I would have alone meditative time, yet learn different art techniques, absorb my surroundings, meet new people, and visit and share with fellow artists.

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Do you remember, as a child, who first shared his or her love of painting with you? Maybe a parent? An aunt or grandparent or teacher? Who got you started?

Recently, several WAS-H members have asked me, "Why don't we sponsor an exhibit of intergenerational paintings co-created by an adult and a child working together?" (Seems to me these people were mainly devoted — even doting — grandparents!)

Why don't we ... sounds like fun! So, in May WAS-H will sponsor its first Intergenerational Exhibit. Our purpose is to offer a fun opportunity to grade school children (ages 5-12) to further their art experience by jointly creating a painting with a (grand) parent or other significant adult and showing their work in a gallery setting.

The theme will be "Creatures of the Land, Sea or Sky, Realistic or Imaginary." Each painting must include at least one living creature (animal, fish, reptile, bug, bird, etc.). Paintings should be no larger than 15" x 22" on water-color paper (140 lb. or heavier) or Yupo or Claybord.

As part of WAS-H's community outreach, we have also invited the kids and adults at Poe Elementary, a nearby Arts Magnet School, to pair up and create paintings for this exhibit. We hope this leads to a meaningful opportunity for both adults and children to enjoy making art together. And we are excited to introduce our Poe neighbors to the wonderful resources and talents of WAS-H.



Volunteer of the Month! — Steve Brenner

WAS-H has a great hero who is leaving Houston in a few weeks in order to live closer to his family. Steve Brenner started out as Treasurer at WAS-H, recruited by the late president Lou Glist. Because of experience in finance at Shell, from which he had retired, and because he had owned a business, he was able to organize, improve upon, and fully understand WAS-H's finances as they continued to become more complicated due to expanded projects and activities. After serving as Treasurer, President Elect and President, Steve continued over more than fifteen years to provide advice, support, and help to each and every board and treasurer. Whenever there was a budget question, Steve could help others understand the figures.

It is difficult to list all the ways Steve has volunteered at WAS-H. If there ever was a visiting workshop artist arriving at the airport, Steve would volunteer to welcome, feed, and provide transportation to the artist. If there was a member needing help with a project, from stag-

ing International Show receptions to delivering a check across the city on a tight deadline, Steve wouldn't hesitate. He hosted Workshop receptions and chaired several workshops. There is no ladder at WAS-H that Steve hasn't climbed to change light bulbs or do property maintenance. He noticed what needed to be done, and he jumped to attention.

Steve has maintained current member records and provided labels to the printer for the monthly *Washrag* newsletter for many years. He also kept our signature membership records for many years.

Finally, and most significantly, we would not have the building we have at 1601 W. Alabama without Steve. He embraced the project, participated in the strategic planning, visited foundations, and pulled the crucial figures together.

When there was a large fundraising effort to be done. Steve was the financial point person. Every foundation we approached for funding, and there were several dozen, needed a completely unique set of financial records configured to their own requirements. Steve worked tirelessly to provide reports from WAS-H's financial history according to each foundation's request. Hundreds of pages of spreadsheets were sent out in grant applications. The funding we received was a result of Steve's expertise that provided financial data meeting individual donor requirements. He was a team member crucial to the success of our Capital Campaign.

As he leaves to embark on the next chapter of his life, the Board, the teachers, and the membership of WAS-H give profound thanks and wish him well.

M. Douglas Walton Workshop Supercharges Individual Creativity for Artists

Under the direction of M. Douglas Walton, an overflowing class of brave and eager artists took the challenge to "supercharge their creativity" and take new risks during the Annual Member's Workshop on October 13-17, 2014. This unique workshop focused more on the artist's personal journey and approach to painting. Doug's inspirational talks challenged artists to find their "personal statement or voice" that ultimately becomes their painting signature and is the thread that ties all their paintings together. It is here that others are able to recognize an artist's paintings by their unique approach. Doug shared that the energy and vitality in paintings are expressed through the philosophical, emotional, and spiritual statement the artist makes rather than by strictly emphasizing the subject matter. "As an artist, our personal significance is our 'how' in painting, rather than our 'what' in painting," Doug added.

To express more spirit in paintings, Doug encouraged the artists to simplify a composition until it becomes the "essence or poetry" of the subject matter. He also cautioned the artists not to be a "tourist"; that is, do not put an emphasis on the end product (the finished painting), but to be a "participant" in the creative process, and the painting would take care of itself.

Along with many exciting painting demonstrations given by Doug during the class, he also shared valuable steps he considers in the creative process of painting:



- 1. Preparation (Quiet your mind and prepare your place to paint with all supplies needed.)
- 2. Incubation (Allow time to contemplate and analyze before going back into the painting.)
- 3. Insight (Wait for the golden moment when it becomes clear how to proceed.)
- 4. Verification (Know what to do to finish and validate the painting concept.)
- "If you know where you are going on a painting, you probably are not taking enough risks. Insight often comes later, not necessarily at the moment the teacher gives the knowledge or instruction. Becoming a significant artist takes time, dedication, and determination, a process of 'Try-Do-Be'. If we 'try' long enough, we will be able to 'do'. If we 'do' long enough, then we will 'be' that significant artist."

Doug Walton concluded this exciting workshop with a tour and discussion of the paintings in the Annual Members Exhibition.
